

Answers

1. White Truck: This is likely a cartel associate in California sent out to engage in intimidation. I took this during an illumination operation.

Notice the license plate is all mangled and unreadable on the truck. This is a technique used by black operations personnel that infiltrators fixers presumably gave as part of "fixer" services to the cartels and gang members. I saw it all over the United States during operations: obfuscated plates, removed plates, obstructed plates, grime or some other material placed over it, plates put in the upper window at an angle, tinted plastic put over the plate, two hitches and racks blocking plates, and paper fake plates with extra small letters and numbers, placed over the real license plate.

- 2. A taco truck used to sell narcotics.
- 3. Yellow bus (generic) used in special operations to provide direction to asset.
- 4. Trash truck. The truck is the means to move through a neighborhood or town as part of intelligence undetected. Law enforcement can schedule trash dumps regardless, but there might be a need to keep it quiet that is completely controlled from even "regular" trash employees.
- 5. The ice cream truck. It is for selling ice cream, but it does more. The Germans also like to use the cream truck for surveillance in Berlin.
- 6. Special Operations team trailers. The goal is signature reduction. To leave a small footprint. Checking into hotels is not always desired and sometimes there is no hotel in the area. Plus, the campers often have windows all around, so it provides a good blind for surveillance for ongoing field operations especially for various perimeters.
- 7. FedEx hiding in plain sight. When this first started, I was made to believe some FedEx vehicles were Sinaloa Cartel cloned vehicles. No, they are sometimes part of the federal intelligence and law enforcement operations team, hiding in plain sight. FedEx is everywhere so it is a good option. It is also a joke. FedEx. Like Fed marks the spot.
- 8. United States Postal Service (USPS). I had USPS vehicles following me around everywhere in remote locations (very rural areas) in 2020, and thought it was part of a cartel team operating in the USA. USPS is also on the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF). I believe the team even hauls some around.
